This might include central topics in faculty meetings, new ideas in communication with parents, interesting assembly programs, etc. Notes on such items could be very brief and yet be of interest to other schools.

It is a sample page of Grohman's The Living World of Plants (translated by Virginia Field Birdsall)*which has just been mimeographed by the Waldorf Institute. It has 102 pages and is richly illustrated. Our art teacher, Linda Lombardi, made the illustrations, recreating Grohman's original sketches. The cost is \$3.75, including postage (even postage abroad!). For orders of 15 or more copies the price will be \$3.25 each. The prices mentioned do not include a binder. It seemed simpler to let you provide a binder of your own choice.

d. Books and articles of value:

Great Sanskrit Plays, translated by P. Lal (New Directions Paperback, published by James Laughlin, Norfolk, Conn., \$2.75). Of value to history teachers in high school and 5th grade. Suitable for high school or 8th grade performances. (The 10th grade of the Waldorf School in The Hague, Netherlands, has a most successful performance of a play from this collection.) I Loved a Girl by Walter Trobisch. (Harper paperback, \$1.25) A touching account of a modern African love story. Excellent for high school students struggling with the problem of sex. The Failure of Technology by Friedrich Georg Juenger (Gateway Paperback \$1.25). Brilliant analysis of the forces inherent in technological "progress". Has been used as a basis for discussions in our senior class.

"Independence for Education": an article by John Gardner in the N.A.I.S. Bulletin this fall. Mr. Gardner's proposal is answered by an independent school educator and by a public school educator.

f. Issues of current interest in our school:

November 8th, Dr. Franz Winkler gave a lecture to parents and high school students on the misguided search for happiness, as symbolized today by a growing obsession with sex. Points raised in this lecture have been further developed in high school forums. Integration and intermarriage have also been discussed in the high school forum, and concurrently, in faculty meetings. Parent representatives of the Financial Advisory Counci have visited all class meetings of parents to discuss annual giving to the school.

A high school Service Club performs jobs for the school on weekends. They are paid \$1.25 an hour. Removal of a huge dead linden tree was one of the first projects.

We have just finished our first series of Adult Education Courses for parents: Sculpture, History, Chemistry.

Because of the cost of supplies and postage, we have come to the conclusion that we must charge a fee for copies of our bulletin. We have set the cost of a year's subscription (2 issues) at 50¢.
