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Giant Horseshoe Magnet (weight 5 lbs., lifts 150 lbs.), Edmund #70571, \$14.00 ppd. The powerful pull of this magnet can create all kinds of magic: As an introduction I usually hide the magnet in its cardboard box from where it will hold a large nail suspended in mid-air. The nail is attached to a string and truly seems to float in the air, several inches away from the box. Tie the string to any suitable object on about the same level as the box. When the students see the horizontally stretched string with a big, quivering nail in mid-air, they are deeply intrigued.

To show the magnetic field, again put the magnet in a box (preferably white), then place sharp-pointed black sheetrock nails on the box. It helps to have a box with a rough surface so that the points of the nails stay where you put

them. Let the students guess the position of the magnet within the box by observing the angles of the quivering nails on the outside of the box. You can also show the lines of force by suspending a nail on a string from your hand directly above the poles. Tie the string to the middle of the nail and move it slowly from pole to pole. The nail will follow the curves of the magnetic lines of force.

Finally, lifting a student off the ground is possible, but you will have to use larger pieces of iron on the poles than are supplied with the magnet. Also, a few words of caution: Never forget to remove your wrist watch before handling the magnet. And supervise closely when students are struggling with the grip of this monster: the skin of one's hands can be painfully pinched if the metal pieces on the poles flip over in unexpected ways when students try to remove them.

9 ft. tall hot-air balloon: Edmund #60971, \$2.00. It will take you about two or three hours to glue the red and white paper strips of this balloon-kit together. With supervision, students working carefully (6th, 7th grade, or older) can do it. The majestic rising of this large balloon is something students never forget. The balloon can be tethered, though a free rising is more spectacular. The last time I used the balloon untethered on a seemingly windless day, it rose to about 500 feet, caught a breeze in the higher air and floated a good mile over Garden City, teacher and students running after it.

Large, brilliant prisms: Edmund # 803, 45° - 45° - 90° tank prisms, \$2.75 each ppd. Though they may have a few chips on the edges, these prisms provide, to my knowledge, the best value obtainable. They are 5 3/4" long so that students can hold them in front of both eyes. If the idea of minor chips bothers you (they don't influence the brilliance of the spectrum obtained), order #801, at \$3.95 each, for a first grade prism.
